| Subject Overview: | This subject integrates the principles of physics and electrical engineering to introduce students to sensor technology. Topics to be covered include the basic principles of the quantum theory of atoms, molecules and solids and the application of these principles to a wide range of materials which are of key importance in modern electronics and technology. In addition to the fundamental concepts, topics to be covered include an introduction to various types of sensors and the basic physical phenomena underpinning their operation. |
| Objectives: | Students completing this subject should be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # explain the fundamentals of the operation of sensors and transducers for the measurement of temperature, pressure, light, stress, composition, fatigue and the chemical environment; and # design a solution to a particular sensing problem based on their knowledge of the physical principles underpinning the operation of each type of sensor. |
| Assessment: | Ongoing assessment of laboratory work during the semester (20%); project work totalling up to the equivalent of 3000 words comprising a written report (15%) and a poster presentation (15%) due during the semester; a 3-hour written examination in the examination period (50%). |
