<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject explores the relationship between the brain and psychological attributes, such as behaviour and cognition. It covers a number of specific areas which may include: the structure and function of the brain in general and clinical populations, laterality, memory, epilepsy, neuroimaging, attention, perception and language.
<b>Objectives:</b>	The subject aims to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># develop an understanding of the structure of the brain and how this structure relates to behaviour</li> <li># develop an understanding of the brain and cognitive function in the intact brain and after brain damage or disease</li> <li># understand the scientific methods that can be used to explore the relation between brain and behaviour</li> <li># develop an ability to construct and critically evaluate studies exploring the relationship between the brain and behaviour</li> <li># understand individual studies within a wider scientific context related to the function and evolution of the brain</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Two written reports/essays of 1500 words each (40%) to be submitted during semester. An examination of no more than two hours (60%) to be completed at the end of semester during the specified University examination period. Each piece of assessment must be completed (hurdle requirement). Attendance of at least 80% of the laboratory classes is a hurdle

	requirement. In case of failure to meet the hurdle requirement, additional work will be required before a passing grade can be awarded.
