<b>Subject Overview:</b>	How do we understand contemporary Australia and America? What are the similarities and differences? This subject compares historical and cultural developments in the United States and Australia. In tracing the similarities and differences in the experiences of these two nations, themes to be addressed will include: frontier histories and the rights of Indigenous people, the media, crime and punishment, political leadership, issues of civil rights, gender, immigration and its resulting social and political consequences, war and society, foreign policy and the ramifications of terrorism. The subject will also investigate the ways Australians and Americans have viewed each other's societies, and the cultural and political ties between the two countries.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># explain some of the key themes and issues that have shaped societies in the United States and Australia</li> <li># comprehend the cultural and economic influence of the United States on Australia in the twentieth century</li> <li># discuss factors that have created similarities in Australian and American history and society, as well as differences</li> <li># demonstrate familiarity with the practice of comparative and transnational history</li> <li># compare and contrast the key issues facing each of these societies today</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Semester 1: An essay of 1500 words 40% (due mid-semester), a research essay of 2000 words 50% (due during the examination period) and a 500 word presentation 10% (during semester). Hurdle requirement: students must attend a minimum of 75% of tutorials in order to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day; after five days, no late assessment will be accepted. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
