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Subject Overview:	This subject introduces students to the special requirements necessary for managing Medical Devices and Clinical/Biotechnological Environments. Topics covered include: detailed analysis of the cardiopulmonary system, including computer-aided modelling of the cardiovascular system and respiratory system; electrical devices that monitor/support these systems, international/national electrical/biological regulatory bodies and standards.
Objectives:	On successful completion, students should be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # Describe the structure and function of cellular and cardiopulmonary systems # Interpret various measures of dynamic responses of the cardiopulmonary system # Calculate vascular resistances using thermodilution techniques # Implement and evaluate a physiological model on a computer # Develop models for analysing physiological systems to determine physiological parameters # Design a monitoring system to monitor a specific physiological process # Describe the principles underlying various life support devices # Identify types of medical devices and their safety requirements # Identify clinical and biotechnological workplace areas with their specialised environmental requirements # Identify the type of methodology required to analyse different systems using clinical studies
