Subject Overview:	The student will negotiate a suitable thesis topic with a supervisor, attend meetings and supervision sessions as required. Enrolment in the thesis is across two consecutive semesters and students must enrol in the subject in each semester to ensure they are meeting the full 50 point requirement for the year-long subject.
Objectives:	Students who complete this subject will: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # be able to a capacity to work consistently and independently at an advanced level on a self-devised project; # be able to demonstrate a well-developed ability to solve problems in the field of creative arts; # be able to have an appreciation of the design, conduct and completion of a major creative project; # demonstrate a capacity to engage where appropriate with issues in contemporary society; and # be able to have a conceptually rich understanding of the theoretical underpinnings and implications of their creative work.
Assessment:	15000 words or equivalent 100% (due at the end of the second consecutive semester of enrolment). Up to 50% of the thesis can be creative work. The dissertation must be at least 50% of the weighting, and can contribute more than this.
