

## GERM30018 East meets West since Unification

<b>Time Commitment:</b>	Contact Hours: A 2.5 hour seminar per week. Total Time Commitment: 2.5 contact hours/week, 6 additional hours/week. Total of 8.5 hours per week.
<b>Prerequisites:</b>	37.5 points of second/third-year subjects in German language. European studies students wishing to enrol in this subject would normally have completed 37.5 points of European studies at second/third year.

<b>Non Allowed Subjects:</b>	Students who have completed 126-471 East Meets West Since Unification are not allowed to enrol in this subject.

<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject examines German responses to German unification and the still faught question of german unity. Does to be German still mean to be West German? What has the result of unification been on East German identity and their sense of belonging to the new Germany? These questions of identity and 'imagined' community will be examined by comparing and contrasting works by East and West German writers from the decade since unification. On completion of the subject students should have acquired a detailed knowledge of a selection of representative German texts since 1989 and an appreciation of the socio-historical context in which these texts were produced and read.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># have gained an understanding of what it means to be German after unification and the problems of belonging and identity for Osis and Wessis.</li> <li># have acquired a detailed knowledge of a selection of representative German texts since 1989.</li> <li># have an appreciation of the socio-historical context in which these texts were produced and read.</li> <li># have a critical appreciation of the conceptual issues concerning the German nation as an "imagined" community and forms of identity formation.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	A 1000 word class paper during semester 30%, and an essay of 3000 words (end of semester) 70%. This subject has the following hurdle requirements: Regular participation in tutorials is required with a minimum of 75% attendance. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day and in-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked.
