<b>Subject Overview:</b>	At the beginning of the twentieth century, the Commonwealth of Australia gained a reputation for its then distinctive political and social arrangements: wage arbitration, industry protection, a mass Labor party, the enfranchisement of women, a &amp;amp;rsquo;..White Australia&amp;amp;rsquo;... One hundred years later, most of these arrangements have been abandoned. those that persist have had unexpected consequences. Why did the Australians of the past support such policies? How and why were they altered? And what have they been replaced with? This course tells the story of the remaking of Australia since 1900. It considers successive transformations wrought by war, immigration, social movements, urbanisation, and economic change. It also examines how such changes have reshaped the everyday lives of Australians (black and white, men and women, rich and poor), their relationships to the past, and their self-conceptions, too. In this way, the study of Australia&amp;amp;rsquo;..s history nourishes a fuller understanding of the problems of the present, and also of the Australia that might come to be.
<b>Objectives:</b>	Students who successfully complete this subject should... <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># have a detailed knowledge of Australian history since 1900. including an understanding of broad shifts in the political arrangements, social relationships and the cultural norms that structure everyday life</li> <li># explain these shifts, and to account for the transformation of Australia over the last century</li> <li># understand the views and actions of those who lived in earlier times and have the ability to use historical knowledge to illuminate the conflicts and possibilities of the present.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	A research essay 2,500 words 60% ,(due mid semester) and a reflective essay 1,500 words,40% (due at end of semester). Hurdle requirement: students must attend a minimum of 75% of tutorials in order to pass this subject.
