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Subject Overview:	This subject explores the relationship between the urban environment and the use of plants in urban landscapes. It examines how urbanisation alters the physical and climatic environment of cities and the influence of these changes on the plants and animals that live in them. Topics include the effects of urbanisation on climate and soils and the response of plants and animals to these changes, mitigating climate change using urban landscape management, identifying and specifying soils for urban landscape projects (including roof-gardens, containers, wetlands) and water-sensitive urban design.

Assessment:	A 120 minute final examination 50% (end of semester), a practical report equivalent to 2000 words 20% (due during semester) and an assignment of 3000 words 30% (due during semester).
