Subject Overview:	In this subject students will consolidate the skills developed in Indonesian Level 4A. Students should be able to read Indonesian texts of different styles and registers, and to write a fairly nuanced essay in formal Indonesian, demonstrating sensitivity to the complexity of Indonesian social life and language.
Objectives:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> # be able to hold sophisticated discussions in Indonesian on a wide range of personal topics and current and historical and issues. # further develop their ability express their ideas orally using sophisticated language. # be able to conduct research and produce essays in standard written Indonesian. # be familiar with a variety of Indonesian texts of different styles and registers. # be able to analyse and comment upon the distinctions between different kinds of cultural discourse. # be able to deploy high-level formal written communicative skills in an analytical context. # demonstrate sensitivity to a complex social and communicative environment.
Assessment:	Class participation 10% (ongoing), written work totalling 1500 words 40% (ongoing), 10 minute in-class oral presentation 10% (mid-semester) and 2-hour written final examination 40% (examination period). Students are required to attend a minimum of 80% of all classes in order to be eligible to take the examination. Class attendance is required for this subject; if you do not attend a minimum of 80% of classes without an approved exemption you will not be eligible for a pass in this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
