<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject is taught by a team of instructors with a range of expertise. It aims to examine the use of Indonesian in professional discourses in a range of areas including politics, law, commerce, religion, and media. Discussion topics are selectively designed for the purpose, beginning with a sketch of the historical development of Indonesian, and Indonesian dialect varieties, followed by discussions on Indonesian as a language of development, of politics, of law, of commerce, of religion, and of media. Crucial concepts underpinning language use and key terms in the focus discourse areas will be explored to enhance understanding of the use of Indonesian. Practical sessions in translation and interpreting will be included in order to strengthen students' skills in these areas.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># to expand students' knowledge and understanding of the use of Indonesian in professional discourse;</li> <li># to enhance practical skills in translating and interpreting.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	An essay (1500 words Â– 20%, Week 5), translation (500 words, 20% - done in class in Week 7), interpreting (10 minutes Â– 20%, Week 9), essay (1500 words Â– 20%, Week 11) and a class Presentation (10 minutes, 20%, Week 12). Class attendance is required for this subject; if you do not attend a minimum of 80% of classes without an approved exemption you will not be eligible for a pass in this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
