Subject Overview:	<p>This capstone subject will allow you to put into practice the skills you have learnt in your Information Systems Degree.</p> <p>This subject is based around the completion of a significant information systems project that is of immediate practical use. Clients of the project will be both external and internal to the University. Students will work in teams of 6 with a staff member allocated to the team as a</p>												

	mentor. Regular meetings of the entire group of students in the subject will be the occasion for students to provide progress reports. There will be lectures and discussions on such topics as project selection, the project process, documentation and writing reports.
Objectives:	At the completion of the subject, students should have gained experience in: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # applying the tools and techniques covered in prior Information Systems subjects; # managing client relationships and expectations; # selecting, planning, executing, managing, reporting on, documenting, and completing a substantial information systems project; and # working with a support group of fellow students and an academic staff member.
Assessment:	Written progress reports on the project due throughout the semester (15%); project planning and management (30%); a final report, product and presentation due at the end of semester (55%). Students may be assessed on individual contributions to group work.
