<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject critically studies the three classical approaches to moral philosophy: Aristotle 'virtue ethics, Immanuel Kant' deontology, and John Stuart Mill's Utilitarianism. As well as examining works by these great thinkers, we look at debates among the contemporary heirs to the traditions they started.												
<b>Objectives:</b>	<p>Students who successfully complete this subject will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># have developed an understanding of the main approaches to the nature of morality.</li> <li># understand the historical antecedents to important contemporary approaches to the nature of morality.</li> <li># be able to think critically about, and to evaluate, the philosophical cogency of those views.</li> <li># have acquired a background for their own further philosophical reflection on morality.</li> </ul>												
<b>Assessment:</b>	A written assignment of 2000 words 50% (due mid-semester), a 2-hour closed-book written examination 50% (held at the end of semester). This subject has a minimum hurdle requirement of 75% tutorial attendance. Regular participation in tutorials is required. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.												
<b>Prescribed Texts:</b>	A subject reader will be available from the bookshop at the start of semester.
