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<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject introduces students to the key social science disciplines that have informed population health and health care, including history, sociology, psychology, politics, anthropology, indigenous studies and gender studies. The subject explores the disciplinary underpinnings of social movements such as feminism, civil rights, and disability rights and their contribution to population health.						
<b>Objectives:</b>	At the completion of this subject, students should be able to demonstrate the ability to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># Understand the different disciplinary approaches of the social sciences and their application to health practice</li> <li># Critically analyse health issues from a range of social science perspectives</li> <li># Critically analyse the relationship between health and the social sciences</li> <li># Understand the potential and limitations of social science disciplines to the understanding of population health challenges.</li> </ul>						
<b>Assessment:</b>	Four written pieces of 1250 words each, due in week 3, 4, 5 and 6 of semester.
