<b>Subject Overview:</b>	The focus of this subject is on the theoretical paradigms, and the political, economic and social determinants of psychosocial practice associated with Oncology. Advances in cancer care, and the relevance of these in relation to life stresses and quality of life, have resulted in the increased importance of psychosocial issues on assessment, intervention and recovery. The subject will include the impact of cancer on the developmental stage of the individual, family and interpersonal relationships, as well as issues related to survivorship and the management of cancer as a chronic illness. Professionals working in multidisciplinary cancer care teams are in a unique position to respond to the needs of people who have been diagnosed with cancer and their carers. This subject will aim to strengthen their capacity to respond effectively and appropriately from a psychosocial service perspective.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># To expose students to the multidimensional aspects of recent developments in relation to advances in cancer care</li> <li># To familiarize students with major current issues in the political economic and service developments surrounding cancer care</li> <li># To enable students to develop critical understanding and assessment of current policy in relation to cancer care</li> <li># To review major research findings and the skill base of focused psychological interventions in cancer care</li> <li># To explore the influences of social cultural economic and environmental factors on survivorship and recovery in cancer care</li> <li># To examine current conceptions and models of psychosocial care related to cancer and relate them to different problem definitions, policies and programs</li> </ul>
