Course Overview:	<p>The Master of Development Studies (Gender and Development) provides specialist training and a professional qualification for graduates who are working, or seeking to work in the development field. It is especially relevant to those with an interest in pursuing careers in fields related to gender and development. The course is designed to give students a firm grounding both in recent theorising about gender and development and in practical concerns surrounding planning for gender in development projects within government and non-government organisations. The course does not necessarily lead to higher degree study, but high achieving students who complete the thesis option may qualify for entry to a masters by research or PhD.</p>								
Objectives:	<p>Students who complete the Masters of Development Studies (Gender and Development) will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # demonstrate a sound understanding of recent developments in feminist theory and the literature in gender and development; # understand the issues involved in debates about the relationships between gender and the development process; # develop an understanding of contemporary feminist debates about gender and development and the relationship of these debates to other areas of social enquiry; # know and be able to use some of the techniques employed in development planning.

The Selection Committee will evaluate the applicant's ability to pursue successfully the course using the following criteria -</p> <p>For the 200 point program</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # an undergraduate degree in any discipline with at least H2B (70%) average, or equivalent. <p>For the 150 point program</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # an undergraduate degree in any discipline with at least H2B (70%) average and at least one year of documented relevant professional work experience, or equivalent. <p>For the 100 point program</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # an honours degree in any discipline with at least H2B (70%) average or equivalent, including a research component of relevance to development and gender; or # an undergraduate degree in any discipline with at least H2B (70%) average and at least two years of documented relevant professional work experience. <p>2. The Selection Committee may conduct interviews or tests and may call for referee reports and employer references to elucidate any of the matters referred to above.</p>
