<b>Course Overview:</b>	<p>The Master of Music is a research degree that prepares students for specialist careers in musicology, ethnomusicology, composition, performance, or music therapy. Applicants should contact the relevant academic staff member to discuss prospective supervision arrangements.</p> <p>All candidates are required to complete satisfactorily a study in one area of specialisation. Total weighting for the course is 150 points; the degree takes 18 months full-time (three years part-time) to complete.</p>

Certified transcripts of academic records at any tertiary institution other than The University of Melbourne must be forwarded with the application. If the transcription is not in English a certified translation must be provided.

**Evidence of Scholarly Ability**

Applicants in Musicology, Ethnomusicology, Music Therapy or Composition are required to submit a copy of their Honours dissertation or a substantial piece of scholarly writing with their application. A research proposal, including topic and proposed methodology, must also be provided.

**Core Participation Requirements:**

- # An understanding of and facility with scholarly conventions in the discipline area;

- # A profound respect for truth and intellectual integrity, and for the ethics of research and scholarship;
- # A capacity to co-operate with other researchers;
- # An ability to manage information effectively, including the application of computer systems and software where appropriate to the student's field of study.
