<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This is a reading subject for students who have completed Arabic 5A or equivalent. Readings will be selected in consultation with the student in the first week of the semester and should be completed in line with the guidelines provided to the student. Focus will be on one area of Arabic studies: linguistics. Students enrolling in this subject should be able to undertake a small-scale research project in Arabic linguistics and present the findings in a scholarly manner.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># be able to undertake a small-scale research project in Arabic linguistics.</li> <li># be able to present the findings in a scholarly manner.</li> <li># acquire the skills to conduct analytical research on complex structures drawing both on detailed knowledge of content and on intellectual tools.</li> <li># be able to communicate scholarly findings acquired through analytical research. and</li> <li># be able to systematically evaluate complex cultural structures in an academic framework.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	An essay of 5000 words 100% (due at the end of semester). Class attendance is required for this subject; if you do not attend a minimum of 80% of classes without an approved exemption you will not be eligible for a pass in this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
