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Subject Overview:	<p>In teaching Block 3, this subject covers advanced radiology used in the detection, diagnosis and treatment of head and neck pathology. It also covers oral pathology.</p> <p>Teaching Block 4 consolidates students' knowledge of the presentation and influence of common medical and surgical conditions encountered in dental practice and how these may be manifested in the oral cavity. Seminars will be conducted linking oral pathology with medical conditions and case histories will be presented for an on-line discussion forum including blogs and wikis.</p> <p>I</p>
Objectives:	On completion of this subject, the student will: be competent in:

	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1 discussing the concepts of total patient care and the dentist's responsibility for the safe and effective management of persons in the dental situation; 2 understanding the fundamental role that oral medicine, pathology and surgery have in the prevention or management of oral disease; 3 appraising that oral disease must be related to the whole patient and not considered in isolation; 4 summarising common clinical activities undertaken by oral health care providers; 5 understanding the risks and hazards to a dentist's health; 6 understanding the differential diagnoses of oral diseases and the use of special diagnostic procedures; 7 discussing the principles of extra-oral radiography and radiology; 8 applying the principles of pathology to the oral region; <p>Have achieved competencies in.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1 applying sound diagnostic skills to identify and describe oral diseases and disorders; 2 describing professional knowledge and displaying self-confidence necessary to propose appropriate treatment plans for oral pathological disorders; 3 providing a logical and coherent description of the clinical, radiographic and histopathological features of oral pathological disorders; 4 discussing the aetiology and management of these orders including the therapeutic and surgical management as well as other treatment modalities.
