<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject examines the processes of communicating across cultures. Topics include language as a manifestation and reflection of culture; language, culture and identity; politeness and "face"; cultural variations in nonverbal communication; power in interpersonal interactions; negotiating a shared basis for communication; discourse variations between cultures; and intercultural gender awareness.
<b>Objectives:</b>	On completion of this subject, students should be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># be aware of the complex relationship between language and culture;</li> <li># understand how language and culture are involved in interpersonal interactions;</li> <li># critically examine their own practice in intercultural interactions; and</li> <li># understand the cultural issues at stake in interpersonal situations</li> </ul>
