Topics that will be examined include: the nature of causation; dealing with issues of attribution; conceptual and technical considerations associated with experimental and quasi experimental designs; as well as alternative strategies for causal analysis.			
Objectives:	This subject is designed to enable students to:  • understand fundamentals of causal description and causal explanation;  • understand the nature, role and logic of experiments in the evaluation of social programs;  • identify strengths and limitations of summative evaluation studies;  • become familiar with alternative approaches and methods for conducting impact evaluations; and  • apply this knowledge to real-world settings.			
Assessment:	There are three pieces of assessment: 1. Written task of 3000 words due in Week 4 (30%); 2. Written task of 6000 words due at the end of the subject (60%); 3. Class or forum participation throughout the semester (10%).
