<b>Subject Overview:</b>	The course covers the fundamentals of setting and achieving bushfire management objectives for ecological and fire protection purposes in natural ecosystems. It covers the contents of a fire management plan, setting objectives, developing fire prescriptions, undertaking monitoring and evaluation of the management process, and review.
<b>Objectives:</b>	By the end of the subject students should: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># Be able to set fire management objectives for individual burns and for broader management areas.</li> <li># Be able to develop burning prescriptions to achieve fauna, flora, and protection objectives.</li> <li># Be able to use a knowledge of plant and animal life history attributes to devise sustainable fire regimes.</li> <li># Be able to devise fire management strategies and plans that maintain water quality and yield.</li> <li># Be able to use GIS programs to develop fire management plans.</li> <li># Be able to establish and run a monitoring program to assess the effectiveness of a fire management plan.</li> <li># Be familiar with the use of Codes of Practice to achieve world best practice in fire management.</li> <li># Be familiar with some key legal responsibilities related to fire management including the maintenance of biodiversity, protection from damaging fires and fire suppression.</li> </ul>
