Course Overview:	<p>The course has been introduced as part of the Melbourne Model at the University of Melbourne. This model allows students to gain broader undergraduate skills through a choice of six generalist degree programs and then to undertake professional or research programs at masters level. This course gives graduates considering a social work career the opportunity of a higher level degree and enhanced learning outcomes, rather than undertaking a second undergraduate degree to achieve a social work qualification. This program prepares social workers for research careers as well as practice careers.</p> <p>The Master of Social Work offers you an outstanding postgraduate course of study, preparing you for professional practice in a diverse range of social work contexts. The course provides you with a nationally and internationally benchmarked course of study in the theory and practice of social work. On completion you will be eligible to apply for membership of the Australian Association of Social Workers (AASW).</p>											
Objectives:	<p>The MSW degree:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # Prepares students for professional social work practice in a diverse range of contexts; # Provides students with foundational theories informing social work practice; # Introduces students to the methods of social work practice, including casework, counselling, groupwork, community development, policy and research; # Introduces students to the fields of social work practice, including child and family, ageing, health, mental health, and disability; # Immerses students in practice through the two 75 day fieldwork placements; # Offers a research pathway for those wanting to pursue further study 											
Course Structure & Available Subjects:	<p>Over two years you will enrol in 175 points of coursework subjects and 50 points of fieldwork subjects. You will undertake four theory subjects totaling 50 credit points per semester in your first year. At mid-year you will undertake a block of supervised field placement of 75 days duration, worth 25 credit points. In the second year you will undertake three theory subjects totaling 37.5 credit points per semester with a mid-year block of supervised field placement, also of 75 days duration worth 25 credit points. In the final semester one subject is an elective concentration subject.</p>

Entry Requirements:	<p>Master of Social Work (225 points)</p> <p>The Selection Committee will evaluate the applicant's ability to pursue the course successfully using the following criteria –</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # an undergraduate degree, or equivalent; and # at least 40 hours of documented relevant work experience; and # a statement of up to 500 words by the applicant. <p>The Selection Committee may conduct interviews and tests and may call for referee reports and employer references to elucidate any of the matters referred to above.</p> <p>Note: Relevant work experience may be paid or unpaid, and may be full-time or parttime, but for part-time experience, at least 40 hours should normally have been obtained in a single three-month period.</p>												
Core Participation Requirements:	<p>It is University policy to take all reasonable steps to minimise the impact of disability upon academic study and reasonable adjustments will be made to enhance a student's participation in the University's courses. This course requires all students to enrol in subjects where they must actively and safely contribute to clinical/field work activities.
