Subject Overview:	A study of music and the practice of music in Europe in the middle ages and early modern period until the mid-eighteenth century. Students will examine selected areas of music such as religious chant, medieval love songs, cathedral polyphony, early opera, instrumental ensemble music, and baroque church music. Students should develop a range of approaches to understanding music history, research methods basic to the scholarly study of music of this period and an awareness of the latest research in the area. Through an innovative class project that combines performance, research and collaborative work, you will engage directly with these repertoires. Lectures, tutorials and the class project are closely intertwined to help you develop an understanding of the main processes of music history during the period covered in this subject. The insight you derive from this subject will enhance your capacity to perform and enjoy this music.
Objectives:	 On completion of this subject students should be able to: # Understand music from the Middle Ages to the end of the Classical period in its cultural context. # Discriminate both aurally and conceptually between the main music genres and styles from the Middle Ages to the end of the Classical period. # Undertake basic scholarly work using music-specific bibliographic tools. # Discuss music coherently using an appropriate technical vocabulary
