Subject Overview:	Students will develop and address a research question in an area of Global Public Health which can be answered by a critical review of the published and unpublished literature, by the analysis of an existing data set or the development of a research protocol. Supervisors will be health professionals in active practice in global health.
Objectives:	At the end of this subject, students are expected to be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # Develop a research question on a global health theme, # Justify the research question using available evidence, # Summarise, analyse and interpret research findings, # Write reports suitable for use by public health practitioners or write manuscripts for publication.
Assessment:	An oral presentation of 15 minutes (10 minute presentation, 5 minutes questions), due during the eleventh week of the first semester of enrolment (15%); an oral presentation of 20 minutes (15 minutes presentation, 5 minutes questions), due during the eleventh week of the second semester of enrolment (20%); a written research report of 5000 to 8,000 words, due during the examination period of the second semester of enrolment (65%). Students must pass the written research report (hurdle).
