<b>Subject Overview:</b>	A comprehensive biopsychosocial approach to the examination and evaluation of various competing theories of aetiology; maintenance and treatment of psychological problems/ disorders that commonly present to clinicians. The conceptual strengths and weaknesses of these theoretical positions will be examined and discussed, and their empirical status will be evaluated.									
<b>Objectives:</b>	The subject will give studentes the opportunity to gain: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># a critical understanding of psychopathology from various theoretical and descriptive perspectives; identify the major theories of aetiology and maintenance for psychological problems that commonly present to clinical practitioners;</li> <li># Critically evaluate the empirical status of these theories and their conceptual strenths and weaknesses; and</li> <li># An improved understanding of the diversity and the complexity of the causality of individual behaviour.</li> </ul>									
<b>Assessment:</b>	An end-of-semester examination of 2 hours duration (80% of assessment) and a mid-semester essay of 500 words (20% of assessment).
