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Subject Overview:	This agency-based supervised placement subject provides an intensive practice learning experience. It provides students with opportunities for both professional learning and development and workplace preparation. Students will learn to integrate <i>advanced</i> theory with practice. They will further develop and consolidate practice skills, increase their knowledge of the interface between policy, research and evidence-based practice and increase their understanding of the organisational context of policy and practice. This subject requires students to attend university and agency-based preparation seminars, early placement									

	seminars and integration seminars and complete the first 35 days of the first professional placement required within the MSW course.
Objectives:	The goal of this subject is to enable students to develop advanced social work practice and intervention skills and a higher level of competence on the key areas of learning. It includes opportunities to complete a placement which focuses on group work, community work, research, social policy and more specialised or intensive direct practice. This practicum also includes a significant research activity.
Assessment:	A hurdle requirement of 100% attendance at a field preparation seminar, field placement and integration seminars totalling 35 days. A 3,000 word practice portfolio and report assessed on a pass/fail basis. The portfolio is developed throughout the duration of the placement, and is due at the end of semester.
