Course Overview:	The masters program in International Justice aims to give students the theoretical tools to understand the central issues in international justice. Topics covered will include: international distributive justice, war, terrorism, immigration and human rights.																				
Objectives:	By the end of the course students will have developed their ability to conduct research on and analyse key concepts and arguments in the field of international justice.																				
Course Structure & Available Subjects:	Students take one core subject (12.5 points) and one elective subject (12.5 points) during the first two semesters of the course and complete one 20,000 word thesis by the end of the third semester. Assessment is based on two 5,000 word essays (one for each course taken) and one 20,000 word thesis.
