<b>Subject Overview:</b>	What is religion? What purposes does it serve? How does it vary across cultures? And why does its importance seem only to increase in this seemingly secular world? In this subject, we explore the ritual practices and symbolic systems that people throughout the world have used to make sense of their place in the social world, the environment, and the cosmos. Students will learn the core anthropological approaches to the study of religion by exploring images of mythic order and social transgression; the divergent functions of trance and shamanic practice in the twentieth century; the roles of religion in social movements; the meaning of pilgrimage; the rise of millenarian and occult movements and the problems of fundamentalism, relativism, and science in the contemporary world. Case studies will be drawn from Africa, South America, North America, Asia and Melanesia.																								
<b>Objectives:</b>	Students who successfully complete this subject will:																								

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># have acquired a grounding in the anthropological and comparative study of religion;</li> <li># have acquired a knowledge of the principal theories and methods employed by anthropologists in the analysis of myth and ritual systems;</li> <li># have a knowledge of the range of varieties of religious experience and representation in the world's societies.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Two 500 word tutorial papers (15% each) due during the semester, and a 3000 word essay (70%) due during the examination period. Hurdle Requirement: This subject has a minimum hurdle requirement of 75% tutorial attendance. Regular participation in tutorials is required. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
