Subject Overview:	This subject forms an introduction to the main theories of development and considers key issues in development such as gender, democracy, globalisation, poverty, development aid, and human security. This subject seeks to foster skills in critical thinking, communication and group work. Students should become adept at synthesising complex theories and ideas and be able to engage in and critically assess a range of contemporary debates in development.
Objectives:	On completion of this subject, students should be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # Understand and appreciate the main theories of development; # Demonstrate a knowledge of the strengths, weaknesses, and embedded assumptions of these theories; # Understand key issues in development studies and development policy; # Have an awareness of alternative theoretical perspectives and various possibilities for theoretical analysis; # Communicate knowledge effectively.
Assessment:	A 1500 word essay (40%) due mid- semester, and a 3500 word major essay (60%) due during the examination period. Hurdle Requirement: Students are required to attend a minimum of 80% of classes in order to qualify to have their written work assessed. Regular participation in class is required. Assessment that is submitted after the due date and up to 10 working days late without an approved extension will be marked on a pass/fail basis only. Assessment that is submitted later than 10 working days will not be accepted or marked. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
