Subject Overview:	<p>This subject introduces multi-dimensional investigations around the Still Life genre explored from a 21st Century perspective. Engaging drawing and painting techniques and processes, this subject is designed for students who have little or no practical experience in art making. Commencing with figurative drawing, students will be introduced to ways of visualizing relevant, abstract concepts as they relate to the still-life genre. Multi-disciplinary investigations around the inanimate object will also focus on the dynamics of colour and pictorial space. Theoretical discussions will explore the human relationship to abstract ideas and the evolution of the still life convention. Projects will be set in both practical and theoretical areas.</p>
Objectives:	<p>This subject aims:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • to create a dialogue between the perceptual, the conceptual and theoretical. It is concerned with the development of concepts and skills that can be employed to construct a contemporary visual language around representations of the Still Life; • to provide an introduction to the knowledge and skills required to effectively represent inanimate objects both from direct observation and through further studio based experimentation towards abstraction; • to offer basic knowledge and experience in drawing and painting and to direct these abilities toward outcomes of artistic conceptualisation and expression.
Assessment:	<p>1. A substantial folio of selected works that will include perceptually based drawing, work made for set exercises/projects and related materials. Due: Last week of semester (75%). 2. Written component: 1,000 word essay. Due: Week following end of semester (25%). Ongoing feedback is provided to students throughout the subject's duration via individual group discussion. Additionally, a progress review will take place midway through the course, taking into account the following criteria:- Course Engagement- Work Development Hurdle Requirement: Students must attend at least 80% of all scheduled classes.</p>
