<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject focuses on advanced modern literary texts, including study of contemporary Hebrew writers in prose and poetry, modern conversational idiom and newspaper and academic articles. At the completion of this subject students should have read, and possess an understanding of, selected advanced scientific and academic articles and essays.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># have acquired a knowledge of advanced literary texts in Hebrew.</li> <li># have further developed their reading skills and understanding of advanced scientific and academic articles and essays, enriching their knowledge of the modern idiom written and spoken in Israel today.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Written essays totalling 2000 words (throughout semester), 40%, a ten-minute oral exam 10% and a 2 hour written examination 50% (at the end of semester). Hurdle requirements. In order to be eligible for final assessment students must attend 75% of classes and complete the exercises and examination. Hurdle requirement: students must attend a minimum of 75% of classes in order to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day; after five working days, no late assessment will be marked. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
<b>Prescribed Texts:</b>	Materials will be given in class.
