Subject Overview:	<p>From the growing influence of Islam and contemporary efforts to deal with past violence, this subject explores the history and lasting legacies of political, social and cultural change in modern Southeast Asia. Using case studies from Vietnam, Cambodia, Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, Singapore, East Timor and the Philippines from the 19th and 20th centuries we will explore European colonisation, anti-colonial resistance, the Japanese occupation, the Cold War and their impact on the societies of Southeast Asia. We will also examine nationalism, decolonisation, and contemporary issues ranging from ethnic tensions, separatist movements, religious revival, economic globalisation and human rights challenges. The focus of this subject will be the experience of Southeast Asian peoples of key moments in history and of broad social changes. Objectives:	<p>Students who complete this subject will</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # understand of the impact of colonialism and war on Southeast Asia. # understand the sources of inspiration and opposition to independence struggles and revolutions in Southeast Asia and the long term implications of these struggles for the countries concerned. # comprehend some of the most important issues for these societies today.
Assessment:	A research essay of 2500 words 55% (due in semester break), a reflective essay of 1500 words 35% (due end of semester) and tutorial participation 10%. Hurdle requirement: students must attend a minimum of 75% of tutorials in order to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day; after five working days, no late assessment will be marked. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
