<b>Subject Overview:</b>	Islam is a significant feature of Southeast Asia's past and present. Employing methodologies and insights drawn primarily from history, political science, and anthropology, this subject explores Islam's place in and contribution to contemporary Southeast Asian societies and politics, as well as its history in the region. Major themes to be explored include: the debates about Islam's spread to Southeast Asia and its interaction with the region's established socio-religious features. the colonial experience. Islam's often contested place in the national life of Southeast Asian nations. its past and ongoing links with the rest of the Muslim world. and contemporary issues associated with the "War on Terror" and conflicts in Muslim societies.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># Understand the role of Islam as a political factor in many Asian countries and contexts.</li> <li># Understand the growing significance of Islam as a political factor in global politics and contemporary international relations.</li> <li># Understand the diversity of political forces and perspectives based on Islam</li> <li># Appreciate and understand the contrast between the multidimensional reality of politics conducted within an Islamic framework and the often simplistic manner in which this reality is portrayed.</li> <li># Understand the major philosophical and practical problems confronted by Muslim political thinkers and practitioners.</li> <li># Critically assess the popular historiographical paradigm in which Islam and the West are considered to be in perpetual conflict.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	A 500 word take home test 20% (due week 6), a 1,500 word journal 30% (due week 8) and a 2,000 word essay 50% (due week 13). Class attendance is required for this subject; if you do not attend a minimum of 75% of classes without an approved exemption you will not be eligible for a pass in this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
