<b>Core Participation Requirements:</b>	The Melbourne Law Masters welcomes applications from students with disabilities. <b>Subject Overview:</b>	<p>The curve of all technology is exponentially increasing: biotechnology, neurotechnologies, information technology and nanotechnology. The next decade is likely to see more profound advances in the medical and biological sciences than have ever occurred. Synthetic biology is just one example. These will present both unprecedented opportunities for the promotion of human health and well-being, but also unique threats and risks to human health, society and the environment. They will raise profound questions of justice and regulation. How we decide ethically to use technology, science and medicine will become more important questions than how we go about discovering more about the causal structure of the world. This subject aims to provide a basic toolkit and skills to engage in deeper ethical reflection about advances in the biological and neurosciences. Professor Julian Savulescu is Director of the Centre for Practical Ethics, the Oxford Centre for Neuroethics and the Institute for Science and Ethics, University of Oxford. <b>Assessment:</b>	5-minute oral presentation and 10-minute questions (in class) (5%) 10,000 word research paper (95%) (16 December) on a topic approved by the subject coordinator
