Subject Overview:	Students will continue to develop an advanced technical, musical and pedagogical background to cope with all stylistic demands of their instrument and voice and build on their concert repertoire covering all styles, specifically including recent Australian works. Outcomes of this study will include a performance and a seminar presentation.
Objectives:	<p>On completion of the subject, students should be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # design and implement a musically coherent recital program; # demonstrate artistic assurance in the preparation of recital repertoire; # perform the component works of a program with musical understanding; # convey a level of instrumental or vocal craft that communicates and enhances the repertoire presented; and # understand the interrelationship between pedagogy and performance.
Assessment:	Vocal and instrumental students: a thirty-five-minute recital examination at the end of the semester of an approved program of pieces (80%), a 20 minute seminar presentation (1000 word equivalent) to be presented 2 weeks prior to the examination (20%) Recital programs must be submitted to the coordinator for approval not later than week 7 of the

	semester. Students are expected to keep a journal containing detailed information from lessons and instrument or vocal class. 100% attendance is expected, less than 80% will result in a fail in the subject.
