<b>Objectives:</b>	On completion of this subject students should: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># have demonstrated a specialist understanding of the topic;</li> <li># have contributed effectively to the work of the seminar;</li> <li># have shown a capacity for an advanced level of analysis and familiarised themselves with the latest direction of research into that particular topic.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	A short essay of 1000 words (20%) due 9 December, and a A research paper of 4,500 words (80%) due 20 January 2014.
<b>Prescribed Texts:</b>	Required readings will be made available electronically via LMS prior to the commencement of the subject's intensive teaching period.
