<b>Subject Overview:</b>	During the imperial New Kingdom period Egypt (1550–1069 BCE) enjoyed unprecedented power, prosperity, and artistic creativity. First we will explore Egypt's relationship with neighbouring Nubia and Canaan within the historical context of the 18th, 19th and 20th dynasties. This will be followed by a fascinating survey of literature and writing, religion and mythology, diplomacy and military conquests, and the transmission of cultural influences. These topics will also be highlighted through an exciting study of key sites, monuments, artefacts and literary (Egyptian, Akkadian, and Ugaritic) sources. Finally, the focus will be on the contributions of such captivating rulers as Hatshepsut, Akhenaten, Nefertiti, Tutankhamun, and Rameses. Students completing this subject will boast a rich and detailed knowledge of the features of the New Kingdom Egyptian Empire.

<b>Assessment:</b>	A journal assignment of 250 words 10% (due week 3 of semester), a class paper/essay of 2000 words (including a 7-10 minute presentation) 45% (presentations during semester, and papers due at end of semester), a take-home examination of 1750 words 35% (due during the examination period), and tutorial participation 10% (throughout the semester).
