<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject introduces students to a range of historical and contemporary issues surrounding the measurement of drug use and the popular and scientific construction of the health, crime and social consequences of drug use. The subject is concerned with the relationships between various constructions of drug phenomena and the policies and practices of drug control. The subject critically addresses issues and techniques involved in demand-reduction (education and treatment) and supply-reduction (law enforcement). At the completion of the subject, students should be able to recognise and explain contemporary discourses on health, harm, crime and public policy related to drug use.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	On completion of this subject students should: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># understand the broad historical and contemporary patterns of drug use in Australia;</li> <li># demonstrate an awareness of methodological issues in the acquisition of knowledge about drug use and its consequences;</li> <li># identify the broad historical, social and political factors which have influenced drug control policies and practices;</li> <li># recognise and explain contemporary discourses on health, harm, crime and public policy related to drug use.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	A 1500 word preliminary essay (30%) due mid-semester, and a research essay of 3500 words (70%) due at the end of semester. Hurdle Requirement: Students are required to attend a minimum of 75% of classes in order to qualify to have their written work assessed. Regular participation in class is required. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per working day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
