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Subject Overview:	In this subject, students focus on a range of technical examination and documentation methods, including visual examination using normal and ultraviolet light, photography, infrared reflectography, stereomicroscopy, x-radiography and how to document observations using a 'Condition Report'. Sampling methods, spot tests and microscopic identification of materials are also studied. During the pre-teaching period students are expected to complete the course readings, review the lectures and any other course preparation as outlined on the LMS. The LMS will become available at the commencement of the pre-teaching dates.
Learning Outcomes:	Upon completion of this subject students should: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # gain an understanding of the processes involved in a range of methods used to examine cultural material. # develop the basic skills required for conservation documentation.
Assessment:	Photography (10%), a 1000 word technical report (30%) and a 3000 word technical report (60%) will be due over assessment period from 28 April - 2 June 2014. Hurdle requirement: students must attend a minimum of 75% of workshops/tutorials in order to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 2% per day; after five days, no late assessment will be accepted. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
Prescribed Texts:	A subject reader will be available in the pre-teaching period. Additional texts may be recommended.
