<b>Subject Overview:</b>	<p><b>Languages of the Screen 3</b> advances students' study of current motion picture and television industry practices and concepts. Lectures, workshops and seminars further develop students' knowledge of the practical and theoretical grammar of the screen, and the direction of performance for screen specific practice. Local and visiting industry practitioners discuss current industry practice in a series of guest lectures and Q &amp; As. Students work with professional actors in workshop environments. Student-produced screen work is critically reviewed in this subject, with particular focus on students developing an understanding of screen languages and screen specific performance.</p>
