Subject Overview:	This subject explores German society, culture and politics from 1933 to 1945, with special emphasis on the origins, development and significance of the Nazi dictatorship. Topics include the post-WWI crisis, the rise of the Nazi movement, Nazi ideology, the collapse of the Weimar Republic, the seizure of power, Adolf Hitler as charismatic leader, the racist character of Nazi society and politics, the position of women, anti-Semitism, "euthanasia," the Holocaust, "Hitler's" war and the nature of the Nazi empire.
Learning Outcomes:	Students who complete this subject will <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # be able to demonstrate a general knowledge of the culture, society and political history of Germany between 1914 and 1945. # understand the causes, character, and consequences of the Nazi movement. # demonstrate familiarity with the major historiographical debates and the variety of interpretive perspectives concerning Nazism.
Assessment:	A primary source document analysis of 1500 words 35% (due mid semester) and a research essay of 2500 words 65% (due at the end of semester). Hurdle requirement: students must attend a minimum of 75% of tutorials in order to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day; after five working days, no late assessment will be marked. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
