Course Structure & Available Subjects:	<p>The MASW is a flexible coursework program of between one and four years' duration, depending on whether you study full-time or part-time.</p>																																																												
Subject Options:	<p>Degree Structure</p> <p>You may choose to complete your degree by undertaking eight 12.5 Specialist Subjects or alternatively, you may choose to undertake five 12.5-point specialist subjects plus a 37.5-point portfolio subject:</p> <p>The specialist subjects can be taken as electives in the Master of Advanced Social Work. You can also take electives external to the School of Social Work, subject to approval by the Course Coordinator. We offer a pool of specialist subjects, most of which are on a 2-year cycle.
