<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject is a detailed examination of the major elements of English grammar using principles of linguistic analysis. Students learn to identify and describe the main morphological and syntactic constructions in English including parts of speech, basic sentence structure, tense, aspect, clause type, negation, complex sentences, thematic systems, ellipsis, coordination, and the relations between sentences in discourse.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># demonstrate a firm understanding of the major elements of English grammar.</li> <li># identify and describe the main morphological and syntactic constructions in English using appropriate terminology and techniques of linguistic analysis.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Eight sets of tutorial exercises totalling 10% (due over the course of the semester), two problem-solving assignments 25% each (due mid-semester and at the end of semester) and a 2-hour examination 40% (during the examination period). This subject has the following hurdle requirements: Regular participation in tutorials is required with a minimum of 75% attendance. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day and in-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked.
