<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject involves a study of one or more key texts and themes in 20th century European philosophy. Students completing the subject should have achieved a critical understanding of the texts and themes discussed and be able to relate them to contemporary issues in philosophy.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	Students who successfully complete this subject will <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># have a detailed understanding of some major texts in contemporary European philosophy.</li> <li># be able to critically evaluate these texts.</li> <li># demonstrate an ability to explain the themes and theses of these texts.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	A 5000-word research essay 100% (due at the end of semester). Hurdle Requirement: Students are required to attend a minimum of 75% of classes in order to pass this subject. Regular participation in class is required. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 2% per working day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
