<b>Subject Overview:</b>	The research project must be in the area of Indigenous health and the topic must be approved by the nominated supervisor. Under normal circumstances, the project will involve: a) a conceptual or theoretical analysis of a given topic in Indigenous health; or b) an analysis of existing data relevant to Indigenous health. Collection and analysis of primary data may be undertaken, but only with the specific approval of the subject co-ordinator, in consultation with the nominated supervisor. Supervisors will be University academic staff with research capacity and interest in Indigenous health.															
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	<p>Upon completion of this subject, students should have demonstrated their ability to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># Complete a critical literature review at masters level</li> <li># Frame a research question and choose appropriate methods of investigation</li> <li># Design and conduct research on stated topic in Indigenous health</li> </ul>

<b>Assessment:</b>	An oral presentation of 15 minutes (10 minute presentation, 5 minutes questions) due during the fifth week of semester (15%); An oral presentation of 20 minutes (15 minutes presentation, 5 minutes questions) due during the eleventh week of semester (20%); A written research report of 5,000 to 8,000 words due during the examination period of the semester of enrolment (65%). Students must pass the written research report (hurdle).
