<b>Subject Overview:</b>	<p>This subject describes current technologies used to sequence genomes - the starting point for comparative analyses of genes and proteins. The field of informatics has evolved to analyse and interpret large amounts of data generated by the new biotechnologies. Advanced topics will include transcriptome technologies, genome evolution and sequence similarity analysis techniques to identify protein orthologues and paralogues. The subject will cover bioinformatic analysis of protein structure and motifs at the secondary and tertiary levels, and modelling</p>									

	studies aimed at drug design. This subject will explore the latest developments in bioinformatics and detail how systems biology is helping to model complex biological processes.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	The objectives of this subject are to provide students with knowledge of: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># current concepts concerning the molecular basis of genome structure and gene expression;</li> <li># theoretical background to genome analysis strategies and technologies and an appreciation of their biotechnological applications;</li> <li># the significance and applications of human and other genome sequencing programs</li> <li># bioinformatic techniques and applications in the analysis of protein structure and function</li> </ul>
