<b>Prerequisites:</b>	French 4 or French 6 or French Language and Culture 1B or French Intermediate Language & Culture B or equivalent.

<b>Non Allowed Subjects:</b>	Students who have completed French Fictions II or The Origins of the Novel at third year level are also not allowed to enrol in this subject.

<b>Subject Overview:</b>	In this subject students will read a selection of novels in French (from the Middle Ages to 18th century) in order to understand the evolution of the French novel. They will have to analyse the narrative structures and demonstrate critical awareness of the social, political and ideological context of each novel. The subject will be taught in French.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	At the end of this subject, students will: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># have gained an appreciation of academic French through the confident use of sophisticated oral and written French at level B2/C1 of the Common European Framework for Languages;</li> <li># have gained an overview of three specialized fields (Middle Ages, Renaissance and Siècle des Lumières) in at least one of the three core areas of French literature, linguistics, and cultural (cinema) studies;</li> <li># have gained a broad understanding of the wider literary or linguistic methods used in the specialist fields of French Studies (eg close reading) as well as of general research and analytical skills;</li> <li># be able to reflect on their identity as a bicultural and bilingual person and as a global citizen;</li> <li># have learned to do self-directed small research projects in the field of French Studies and to locate pertinent research literature in both French and English;</li> <li># be able to make wide use of learning and research technologies in French and English.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	One class paper in French equivalent to 1000 words due during semester [30%] One folio of writing exercises or oral presentation in French totalling 1400 words due during semester [35%] One reflective essay in French totalling 1600 words and using some academic sources due at the end of semester [35%] This subject has the following hurdle requirements: Regular participation in tutorials is required with a minimum of 75% attendance. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day and in-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked.

<b>Prescribed Texts:</b>	A subject reader will be available through the University of Melbourne Bookshop. Chrétien de Troyes, <i>Le Chevalier au lion</i> ; Madame de Lafayette, <i>La Princesse de Clèves</i> ; Laclos, <i>Les liaisons dangereuses</i> .
