

## ITAL30005 Contemporary Italy Study Abroad

<b>Credit Points:</b>	12.5
<b>Level:</b>	3 (Undergraduate)
<b>Dates &amp; Locations:</b>	This subject is not offered in 2015. On site in Prato, Tuscany, Rome, and Milan, Italy.
<b>Time Commitment:</b>	Contact Hours: 24 hours of classes; 3 day trips; 3 half-day excursions. The travel component of this subject takes place between 23rd of November and 20th of December 2014 Total Time Commitment: Total of 170 hours.
<b>Prerequisites:</b>	Completion at least 25 points of Italian Studies subjects with an average grade of H2B or above.
<b>Corequisites:</b>	none
<b>Recommended Background Knowledge:</b>	none
<b>Non Allowed Subjects:</b>	Students who have previously completed the subject Rome: Fact or Fiction at Levels 2 and 3 or Contemporary Italy Study Abroad at Level 2 or Level 3 are not allowed to enrol in this subject.

<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject provides students with a three-week intensive language and culture experience in Prato, Tuscany. The focus of the subject will be an exploration of aspects of contemporary Italy including language, culture, society, politics and the Arts. Students will be involved in a range of collaborative activities with Italians. The subject will integrate information technology to establish ongoing relationships.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	Students who complete this subject will: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># interpret and analyse a variety of texts and genres, both written and spoken, of a moderate level of complexity</li> <li># interact through written and spoken language in a range of authentic contexts using appropriate language while in-country</li> <li># explore elements of contemporary Italian culture and Italian linguistics through direct contact while in-country</li> <li># apply research methods appropriately to task</li> <li># critically reflect on contemporary Italian language and culture based on direct experience while in-country</li> <li># actively compare and contrast linguistic and cultural similarities and differences between assumptions of Italian language and culture and real life exposure while in-country</li> <li># through a range of tasks and class experiences, apply a variety of learning techniques to further consolidate knowledge, understanding and ability in relation to Italian language and culture</li> <li># communicate effectively with a range of interlocutors while in-country</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Contemporary language and culture group project (750 words) [15%] Regular language exercises, equivalent to 600 words [15%] Oral presentation of 5 minute, equivalent to 400 words [10%] All due during the teaching period in Nov/Dec Reflective intercultural journal, equivalent to 600 words [15%] Final research paper (1800 words) [45%] Due in January of the following year. This subject has the following hurdle requirements: Students are required to participate in all scheduled activities. All pieces of assessment must be submitted to pass this subject.
