<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject aims to supplement core Japanese language subjects with key analytical tools and strategies. They should enable students to engage in interactions in Japanese effectively in achieving intended social and communicative goals. Students will be introduced to Japanese sound systems, key characteristics of conversational patterns, and socio-culturally rigid as well as negotiable aspects of the language.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	On successful completion of this subject, students should: be able to understand fluid and negotiable nature of interactions in Japanese and in one's first language; be able to have a greater sensitivity in choice making in conversations; be able to analyse Japanese conversational dialogues with the knowledge of aisatsu ritual and other conversational routines, politeness, and ellipses; be able to conduct everyday conversations and manage classroom communication in Japanese with greater sociology-cultural awareness; be able to present opinions in both spoken and written forms; be able to reflect on their first language and culture from intercultural perspectives; be able to understand and analyse Japanese discourse in relation to speaker intention; be able to appreciate some of the great Japanese literary works.
<b>Assessment:</b>	Written/oral work totaling 2500 words 60% (due throughout the semester) and a 2-hour final examination 40% (due during the examination period). Class attendance is required for this subject; if you do not attend a minimum of 80% of classes without an approved exemption you will not be eligible for a pass in this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved

	extension will be penalised at 10% per day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
