<b>Subject Overview:</b>	As well as being beautiful in its own right, algebra is used in many areas of mathematics, computer science and physics. This subject provides a grounding in several fundamental areas of modern advanced algebra including Lie groups, combinatorial group theory, category theory and homological algebra. The material complements that covered in the subject Commutative and Multilinear Algebra without assuming it as prerequisite.								
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	On completion of this subject, students should have an understanding of: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># The geometry of Lie groups, and important examples coming from linear groups;</li> <li># Lie algebras, the exponential map, and the relation with Lie groups;</li> <li># Free groups, presentations, free products (with amalgamation);</li> <li># Basic category theory: categories, functors, natural transformations, adjoints. (Co)products, universal objects, (co)limits, especially pushouts and pullbacks;</li> <li># Homological algebra: (pro/in)jective objects, resolutions, chain complexes, homotopy, the snake lemma. Applications: Ext, Tor, group homology;</li> <li># Noncommutative algebra: semisimple rings, modules, Wedderburn theorem.</li> </ul> Be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># prove results about Lie groups and algebras;</li> <li># give presentations of groups and algebras;</li> <li># construct and compute derived functors.</li> </ul>								

<b>Assessment:</b>	Up to 40 pages of assignments (30%: three assignments worth 10% each, due early, mid and late in semester), a 3-hour written examination (70%, in the examination period).
